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Country Cream Executive - Part 2




So I'll begin with apologies to all who have been hanging out to see an update on my country cream executive.

So where did I leave off? Right so with the engine out of the car and off to have a new cylinder sleeve installed as well as new cam bearings, what better time to pay some attention to the developing rust in the fire wall around the factory air conditioning.

As well as the fire wall rust there is also rust on the inner guards where that horrible executive sound deadening is. And the battery tray needs to be replaced.

So after removing the sound deadening all that was left was rust and the crappy glue residue so I decided to have the entire engine bay and plenum sand blasted.



After the sand blasting was done the car was masked up and a nice clean looking coat of primer went on and the real extent of the rust was revealed.







Under the battery tray was pretty bad!



And an entire replacement section was found and made to fit.



Next it was on to the firewall.

The rust in the firewall was in some pretty difficult positions so I decided to remove the firewall completely to make it a little easier, and the side bonus is that it allows me to treat and prime the metal between the 2 skins.





< Both sides needed this treatment in the lower corners of the ac port.


Even the holes for the heater hoses needed some attention.





In-between working on the firewall and replacing the battery tray I also has to have a look at the inner guards where the old sound deadening was.

One such spot made a good marker holder for a brief time before the section was replaced.



Whole bits were replaced where needed and some holes I managed to get with spot welds. Again, both sides were like this in sections.

But with all these areas treated it was time to move on the re-installing the fire wall.





The fire wall that I removed from the car was pretty trashed in some spots, but as we all know panel fitment between cars can be pretty bad so a donor fire wall wasn't really an option.



75% of the lower section was replaced and double layer of steel was removed on both sides where the heater hoses and brake booster are located, this will prevent any further build up of moister between the layers and causing rust later on down the track.



Orange Car

The "Orange Car" is a 1974 matching numbers factory 4-speed V8 Super Home on Th'orange P76. Like many P76's the Orange Car was unregistered for many years. By the time I bought it a fair bit of mechanical work had been done in preparation for getting it road registered again and this occurred when I purchased it in July 2019. It does not seem as long as 4 years ago! As with many of us, life happens and my cars took a back seat for a while. Since I have started to drive the Orange Car, I have come across things that I have wanted to change for my own satisfaction and peace of mind.

I had a relay for the starter motor installed and because I don't really trust 50-year-old wiring I had an in-line 30-amp fuse put into the main wiring harness to minimise the possibility of electrical fires. After a bit of driving, I found that the contacts in the ignition switch were causing the car to "do its own thing" in terms of starting and shutting off – or not, what happened in the engine bay was unrelated to the key.

Very disconcerting.

I bought a specially made ignition switch wiring assembly and installed that into the back of the ignition switch and at the same time removed the steering lock. So far so good. The ignition job required the dash to come out

(and we all know what a pain that is) so at the same time I changed over all the dash globes to LEDs, installed a new oil pressure gauge in the switch facia, installed and wired up a new stereo, installed a new blanking plate (to close that semi-circle gap above the steering column) and did a general tidy up of the cavity and wiring behind the gauges.

During the process of removing the gauges and the surrounds the brittle plastic cracked. I came across a great product called "Rapid Fix" which bonds plastics, metal and rubber to fill cracks and gaps and can be drilled, sanded and painted. It is easy to use, sets very quickly and it sealed and strengthened the cracks I accidentally put in the dash. Interestingly, it is also suitable for use with petrol and oil so can be used to repair plastic fuel tanks on items like whipper snippers.

Over time anything vinyl in the car becomes dry and stiff. Research suggested that one way to remedy this (before I get around to reupholstering the seats) is to wipe over the vinyl (and any plastic like the dash pad and door cards) with a very thin layer of mineral oil (aka baby oil). Applying mineral oil allows the material to absorb the chemicals that have leeched out over time. I have been pleasantly surprised at how much the vinyl and plastic absorbs the oil and gets rejuvenated. Obviously, it does not fix the cracks in vinyl or plastic but it does make dry stiff vinyl look and feel heaps better. I've been doing this regularly with all the cars and it has certainly improved them.

When driving I found that the car would quite happily get rather hot even in cool ambient temperatures. Initially, I changed the coolant (just to be sure), and then with no improvement I installed a slightly cooler thermostat, a brand-new viscous clutch fan and an in-line coolant filter. The in-line filter has been very beneficial in catching all sorts of debris so I can remove it from circulation. Quite an eye opener really. I'm yet to drive it in warm/hot weather to test the new fan, I dare say that will happen soon, but so far, I've noticed an improvement. Fingers crossed. The other thing I have done in the engine bay is to sand blast and re-paint the air cleaner. Stamps Industries were very helpful in matching the paint colour and making up a couple of rattle/aerosol spray cans to do the job. My next task is to blast and paint the rocker covers to tidy them up a bit.



My efforts to date have been aided by the practical help of my husband Adrian and the valued input from various members of the P76 community, near and far.


